How do I apply for college without having been to many college fairs? How do I know what major I want to pursue if I've never sat in a classroom before?





Around **4.3 million students are homeschooled** in the United States.




In Spring 2019, 2.5 million homeschoolers were enrolled in colleges.




Homeschooled students have also **done better on standardized admissions tests** than other students elsewhere and can fare just as well in college as their public and private school peers.

It might feel like, as a homeschooler, the application process for college will be drastically different than it is for those who attended public or private schools.

While there are some things homeschoolers might have to go about differently when submitting documents, have no fear—the credentials and documents for homeschoolers are the same as those for anyone who attended public or private school.

How Do You Apply to College as a Homeschooler?

Since the popularity of homeschooling has grown and more homeschoolers attend college, many colleges now have specific instructions for homeschoolers. Instructions may vary by school, but generally, there are three main things you have to submit for an application:

- Proof of high school completion.
 This usually means copies of an unofficial transcript before you graduate high school and an official copy after.
- Any standardized test scores required by the school, such as an SAT or an ACT.
- Any essays required by the school, such as a personal statement.

If you're worried about figuring out what the colleges you want to apply for require, worry no longer. Most colleges have clear-cut instructions about what they require for application somewhere on their website, and if you can't find that, you can always reach out to a college's admissions office. They'll be happy to hear from you!




Whether you're looking for ways to make your application stand out or ways to get connected at college, you, as a homeschooler, can make your time in high school count for your college experience.
